

A YEAR OF IMPACT. 30 Years in the Making.

When our founders, members of the Duval County Medical Society, opened a weekly free clinic in Arlington as an outreach of Christ the King Catholic Church in 1993, they couldn't have known how the need for services would grow. What started as a walk-up clinic day morphed into a network of providers willing to offer free services in their own offices under the State of Florida Volunteer Provider Program. As that network widened and required coordination, the simple idea of connecting patients without insurance to volunteer medical specialists would ignite a movement.

As we enter our 30th year of coordinating specialty health care for uninsured patients, we are proud of how our organization has grown on behalf of our neighbors in need:

- 587 volunteer physicians and medical professionals provided services to 1,741 patients during FY 22
- WeCareJax nurse case managers, community health workers, and care coordinators supported patients facing cancer, diabetes, cardiovascular disease, and other conditions to assure the best health outcomes possible—with wraparound attention to the social determinants of health

 In fact, our Cancer Care Cohort saw three times the number of patients with a diagnosis of cancer than in any other time in our history last year alone

The bridge to cover gaps in our local healthcare system relies on the volunteer specialty physicians, hospitals, treatment centers, and medical professionals who share their time, expertise, and skills at no cost to uninsured neighbors living at or below 200% of the federal poverty level. These dedicated partners donated \$21.5 million of healthcare and services to WeCareJax patients in FY 22. Thirty years ago, none of our founders could have dreamed this would be possible!

Thank you to everyone who supports and befriends us. You make it possible for the dedicated staff of WeCareJax to encourage and console people when they have a life-changing—or often life-saving—need. We stand proudly on the shoulders of our founders and look forward to our next 30 years with you by our side.

FOCUS: WELLNESS!

In collaboration with the Center for Sustainable
Agricultural Excellence and Conservation, WeCareJax
began helping cancer patients get the best nutrition possible
during the pandemic. Having access to healthy, fresh foods
directly affects each patient's ability to cope with treatment and side
effects. Nutrition is one social determinant of health we are dedicated to
improving for our patients—and we continue the bi-weekly home deliveries
today, thanks to donors and supporters who make it possible.

WeCareJax staff and volunteers provide bi-weekly produce and pantry essentials deliveries, which include produce picked up straight from the farm, protein and hydration supplements, essentials in creating healthy meals, and a nutritious recipe from Blue Zones. In 2022, we also began offering post cancer treatment nutrition options for patients. Anyone in surveillance can visit with Feeding NE Florida's nutrition team when they visit their RN Case Manager at our offices twice a month. These are a few of the ways we are helping our neighbors find that food is medicine.



MR. JARITZ. Mr. Jaritz had no insurance, but when he was first diagnosed with Chronic Myeloid Leukemia in 2019, he attempted to pay for his treatment himself. As his care escalated, he could no longer keep up with the expenses and he was referred to one of WeCareJax's primary care partner clinics,

Community Health Outreach.

Mr. Jaritz was connected
with oncologists at
Mayo Clinic Cancer
Center at Ascension
St. Vincent's Riverside for
treatment. He also received a
pacemaker to deal with a cardiac
issue that arose during his cancer
treatment.

Mr. Jaritz is currently continuing active treatment at Baptist MD Anderson Cancer Center and receiving chemotherapy for his initial diagnosis.
